Oral History Project, lasting about eight years and resulting in accounts given by forty former legislators. The entire collection will be transferred by June 30 to the university archives in Brookens Library where it will be made available to the public. The closing of the office is due to a certain extent to tight budget adjustments, but Cullom believes that the transfer to the Brookens Library archives is a logical move, making the collection available eventually for wider use even though there have not been enough monetary grants to continue the office on a separate basis. Cullom has not directed the program since 1988 when he left to head the Lincoln Legal Papers Project for the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency. He will continue to teach a course in oral history at SSU and some of the interviews will be added to the collection.

"A GUIDE TO THE HISTORY OF ILLINOIS"

This new book, a part of the series, "Reference Guides to State History and Research," is edited by John Hoffman, librarian of the Illinois Historical Survey, University of Illinois. This is the first comprehensive guide to the literature and sources of Illinois history. Part One containes a number of essays concerning particular periods and topics in the history of the state (One essay, "Illinois Since 1945", is by Cullom Davis.) Part Two provides detailed information on archival and manuscript collections. he restoration of the majestic Barton Theatre Organ

The restoration of the majestic Barton Theatre Organ at Springfield High School was celebrated with a concert which drew a full house on May 5. The organ was saved from the Orpheum Theater demolition in 1965 and moved to the school, but was seldom used until its restoration this past year by the Springfield Theatre Organ Club, aided by donations from the Springfield Clearinghouse Assoc., Illinois Bell Telephone Co., and the Springfield Public Schools Foundation. A fine concert was presented by Jack Moelmann of St. Louis, past president of the American Theatre Organ Society. Many in the audience came from St. Louis and other midwest towns to hear the concert made possible by the dedicated handiwork of the Springfield Organ Club. One part of the program featured an old silent Laurel and Hardy movie, "From Soup to Nuts," accompanied by organ music as in the "old days" before the "talkies" came along.

In late May the Illinois House approved a bill which would designate the old U.S. 66 route as a state historic highway. If you want a very entertaining account of the reminiscenses of many people along its entire route, Chicago to Santa Monica, CA, get local author Tom Teague's new book, Searching for 66 - then read and enjoy! Much of the old road is gone now, its route taken over by the ubiquitous Interstates, but it is held in vivid memory, as Tom discovered in a 4-month drive west, taking the path
