Dr. Brandon Curry, Senior Geologist from the Illinois State Geological Survey at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, will discuss the glacial geology of the Buffalo Hart Moraine on Saturday, September 26 at

The free lecture, open to the public, is part of a year-long series of events marking the Buffalo Hart Presbyterian Church's historical ties to the community. The church was built in 1896.

On Saturday, March 27 at 2 pm, Dr. Michael Wiant, Director of the Dickson Mounds Museum, will speak about the Native American presence in the Buffalo Hart area. Individuals who have artifact collections from this era are invited to bring them for display.

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# Jack Alexander: Love of History Learned at an Early Age

Jack Alexander learned about history at his father's knee, a good thing for the 36-year-old Springfield native and Sangamon County Historical Society director. Alexander recently became Site Superintendent for the Lincoln Tomb.

"My dad, it seems, was almost always in a discussion with someone about Illinois history or the Civil War or Abraham Lincoln and somehow just being around this on a regular basis, the interest in me grew as well, wanting to know more about those stories," he says.

Alexander is the first to admit that he's no expert on Lincoln, but he is a quick study. "There is so much information about this great man that is available due to such a high global interest, especially in the Springfield area. I have quite a collection of Lincoln books--just ask my wife--and I'm usually reading a new Lincoln book at any given time. I must admit though, that when I showed up for my first day at the Lincoln Tomb I felt like there was an entire part of Lincoln's story that I was going to have to learn rather quickly," he recalls.

Alexander's new job keeps him busy overseeing every aspect of the historic site's operations, from routine administrative duties to conducting research, and developing an interpretive plan for the popular tourist destination. He loves every minute of it.


"The biggest challenge to me so far has been to try and find more time to spend with the visitors to our site. I really enjoy talking about history with people and especially about President Lincoln, explains Alexander, who is in his second year on the Society's board and is chair of the program committee. "The reward to me is hearing from those visitors how meaningful their visit was or even how beautiful the site looks. The staff at the Lincoln Tomb works very hard to try and provide our visitors with a memorable visit."

"I have always focused on the life of Lincoln and never really put much of a focus on his death and the creation of his final resting spot. So, I still continue to learn, almost daily, about the fascinating history of the Lincoln Tomb and Oak Ridge Cemetery."

The History Channel's recent broadcast of "Stealing Lincoln's Body," and Thomas Craughwell's book by the same name, has definitely captured the public's interest in visiting the Tomb, he adds. "I am amazed at just how many people that visit have that topic in mind and want to know just how much of the story is true. I hope to develop some sort of program in the near future that we can offer where we talk more about this part of the site's history. I believe that it, too, is a part of the history of the Lincoln Tomb and should be told in the proper format."

Though born in Springfield, Alexander did most of his growing up in Virden. After graduating Virden High School in 1991, he enlisted in the Army, serving in Germany and the United States. "I utilized my G.I. Bill and Army College Fund, rather than taking a bonus check for signing up, to help me get my professional career determined." After graduating from Lincoln Land Community College with an associate's degree, Alexander went on to the University of Illinois at Springfield from which he was awarded a bachelor of arts degree in history.

I had just completed my first semester



of "graduate studies, also at UIS, when I was offered a position as a site interpreter at the new Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum." The Museum is administered by the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency, which also operates Lincoln's Tomb and about 60 other historic sites and memorials around the state. Alexander served as a site interpreter for nearly three years before taking the Lincoln Tomb post three months ago.

Alexander and his wife Darla, whom he married in 1998, have two children, an eight-year-old son and a six-year-old daughter. They reside in Springfield.
