

# Ex-Political Reporter to Share What He's Learned from a Career Covering Famous and Infamous 

Former St. Louis Post-Dispatch Illinois political correspondent Taylor Pensoneau, will provide an insiders look at the people and events he's covered over his long and award-winning journalism career when he speaks to the Society at its monthly program meeting on Tuesday, November 18.

The meeting will begin at $5: 30$ p.m. in Carnegie Room North at the City of Springfield's Lincoln Library. The session is open to the public.

Pensoneau, a past president of the Sangamon County Historical Society, spent 16 years at the Post-Dispatch, the last 12 covering the Illinois State House. He left the newspaper in 1978 to begin what turned into a 26 -year career with the Illinois Coal Association, the trade organization for the state's coal industry. He retired in December 2003 as president of the association, carving out a second writing career as a biographer and historian.

## Mark DePue to Train Volunteers Interviewing Workshop November 20 Exclusively for Society Members

Want to help preserve Sangamon the people, communities, organizations and County's history? Here's your chance.

Oral historian Mark DePue will lead a oral history interviewer training workshop exclusively for members of the Sangamon County Historical Society on Thursday, November 20 at the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library. This initial session is limited to the first eight Society members who register. A complimentary lunch will be served to participants. The workshop will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

DePue, director of oral history at the Lincoln Presidential Library, will teach the techniques of conducting oral interviews so as to allow volunteers to interview a broad range of individuals whose knowledge of specific events need to be recorded, catalogued, and archived for future generations.

Society Executive Coordinator Sam Wheeler and Mike Kienzler, editor of the Society's new SangamonLink.org searchable on-line county encyclopedia, will be working with DePue to develop topics that will be specific to the needs of the new site.

Those who complete the training will also be provided with and instructed on the use of recording equipment in conducting interviews.

## Society's Festival Tree Honoring Old Schools

Visitors to this year's Festival of Trees will get a history lesson anew when they view the Society's annual entry into the holiday season display that draws more than 30,000 to the Orr Building on the State Fairgrounds in Springfield.

This year, the Festival, a charitable event that benefits Memorial Medical Center's regional outreach programs, will run from Saturday, November 22 through Sunday, November 30.

And, as in past years, the seven foot tree decorated by the Society will have an element of local history as its theme. This year, its ornaments will carry photos of old schools from across the county, from oneroom school houses to those built as late as the 1930s. Some of the buildings have been razed, others put to other purposes, while others continue in use despite several decades since their construction.

Photos for the one-of-a-kind handmade "school bell" ornaments came from various sources, including the Sangamon Valley Room at the City of Springfield's Lincoln Library and local photographers. The theme for this year's tree was suggested by Society president Mary Alice

Davis.
Themes for previous Society trees have focused on historic Sangamon political and community leaders, old barns, and historic sites past and present. One of its trees was selected for a post-Festival showing at the Governor's Mansion in Springfield.

REMEMBERED: In a presentation laced with humor and pathos, Illinois State Historical Society executive director William Furry gave a packed room of Society members and guests a short course in forgotten local history in a powerpoint show October 21, "Now You See It, Now You Don't." The session, the Society's regular monthly program meeting, was held at Springfield's Lincoln Library. And no, that tongue-in-cheek photo of a Great Wall of China look-alike construction site on the cover of last month's Historico, was not, as Furry jokingly admitted, part of Springfield's history. Well, maybe just a little bit. Furry pointed out that the construction behind it was a genuine artifact of an earlier Springfield era: a roller coaster on North Eighth that in the early 1900s was part of Zoo Park, a amusement complex that quickly faded into history because it was too far from public transportation. Program goers also got a close-up of the huge fountain at Reservoir Park on Springfield's north end (center right), a major city recreational area that included lagoons for boating in summer and ice-skating in winter. Razed to make way for Lanphier High School, all that remains is the baseball field. Also lost in time were the military accomplishments of Lieutenant Colonel Otis B. Duncan (center right), the highestranking black officer to serve in the American Expeditionary Forces in Europe in World War I. Duncan, who came from a prominent black Springfield family (his grandfather was William Fleurville, Lincoln's barber and friend) was awarded the coveted French Croix de Guerre for his war service. Springfield American Legion Post 809 is named after Duncan.

In fact, local history groups have a wide variety of items you usually don't see on department store shelves, from books that are specific to a local his-tory-laced event to works of art.

This year, we've done some of the legwork for you. The best part is that most if not all of what you spend will help these organizations further their mission, support the operation of their sites and/or benefit the community.

Gifts of Membership: Virtually every area history organization can arrange for you to give a gift of membership. The Sangamon County Historical Society, for example, will send a personal card notifying the recipient of your gift that not only includes membership, but also a free subscription to Historico, the Society's awardwinning monthly newsletter. Most other history groups can provide the same service. Check websites, call, or visit the history sites in person to make gift membership arrangements or other gift purchases.  coln Tomb coin, in copper and black, is $\$ 12.50$ including tax and postage. The Lincoln Tomb commemorative medal, also in copper and black, is $\$ 17.50$. Both are packaged in plastic display

(which posts local purchase sites) you can now acquire the official 2014 City of Springfield ornament that this year features historic Pasfield House built in 1896 by Dr. George Pasfield as a wedding present for his son. Now a bed and breakfast, it's on the site of a once 40 acre estate housing three generations of George Pasfields, each a community leader. The 24 -karat gold plated ornament, priced at $\$ 32$, is part of a series honoring historic and architectural treasures of Springfield and is the first in color. Proceeds will benefit Saint Joseph's, a nursing and shelter care home for the elderly founded in 1903.

 For $\$ 25$ you can also purchase a print of the Inn in a drawing commissioned by the Pleasant Plains Historical Society and created by prizewinning Springfield artist William Crook Jr. A colorized version is available for $\$ 35$.
 A 16 by 20 inch photograph of Abraham Lincoln by Alexander Hesler from the Springfieldheadquartered Illinois State Historical Society, is yours to give and or keep with a purchase that will help underwrite the Society's programs, scholarships and awards. The portrait is available matted for $\$ 150$ or framed for $\$ 350$ from its new headquarters at the Strawbridge-Shepherd House, 5255 Shepherd Road.

An on-site visit to the Vachel Lindsay Home at 603 South Fifth Street, Springfield will be required if you'd like to purchase a copy of Vachel Lindsay's poem-turned-book, The Little Turtle, illustrated by George Colin, for $\$ 12.95$. Copies of the book and related items including note
cards (\$12) for Lindsay fans are available at the site from the Vachel Lindsay Association, but call ahead to 217-524-0901 since hours of operation are sea-
 sonal. If there's a railroad buff on your list, head over to the Chatham Railroad Museum, at 100 North State Street, Chatham. You'll find tshirts inscribed with the design (above left) for $\$ 15$, mugs, books on rail-
roading, engineer caps and more in the gift shop of this charming former train station filled with railroad memorabilia.

For more Abraham Lincoln-oriented gifts, there's the shop at the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum Gift Shop at 212 North Sixth Street, Springfield, which also has an extensive on-line presence at shop.alplm.org
