
The October edition of *Historico* will provide maps, parking information and more. "We think everyone will be pleased...and safe as they see this local and national historic treasure first-hand," Davis said.

> The cemetery walk, cosponsored by the Society and Oak Ridge Cemetery, was held annually for twelve years from 1996 to 2008 and returned in 2015 by popular demand. It was held every year since, until 2020 when the pandemic spread of Covid halted major activities here and around the nation.

> The 365-acre Oak Ridge Cemetery is bordered on the west by North J. David Jones Parkway (North Walnut Street) and North First Street on the east in Springfield. It is the largest municipal cemetery in Illinois and is the sec-
