grant awarded to the Dana Thomas Foundation and the Springfield Art Association to help underwrite reproduction of some of her photographs, some of which were shot at the Dana Thomas House.

Klickna and Smith had an opportunity to meet two of Day's granddaughters, Kitsie Demby and Barbara Sutton, who shared stories of their family and Susan Lawrence Dana, and allowed photographs of Day's scrapbooks and art portfolios to be reproduced. These will be shown during the presentation. The artwork by Susan Lawrence Dana, called Effect in Blue will also be shared.

Day, daughter of Judge Eugene Gross and his wife, Susan Zimmerman Gross, grew up in the same Aristocracy Hill neighborhood as Susan Lawrence Dana. Eugene Gross was a close friend of Susan Dana's father, Rheuna Lawrence Dana.

The two young girls stayed friends into adulthood, with Day, by then a professional photographer, often using Susan's yard as backdrop for her work.

Day's stories, poems, and sketches appeared in several leading publications of the period, including The Ladies' Home Journal and Woman's Home Companion. She was on the staff of the Burr-McIntosh Monthly, published from 1903-1910.

Her written work included In Shadow Town published in 1907 and Borderland and the Blue Beyond in 1908. Married in 1886 to George Edward Day, a Springfield businessman. she died in 1910 at age 48 and was buried at Oak Ridge Cemetery.

died within a six month period in 1900 rooms on 16 different levels. An -01, Susan and her mother, Mary Agnes Lawrence, (who died in 1905) were the primary heirs of the estate. In 1902 they hired Frank Lloyd Wright to remodel and expand their home.

Completed in 1904, the 12,600 square foot Wright-designed home on Fourth Street, became not only a venue for lavish entertaining, but also a community center for education and the arts and a platform for the women's rights movement.

Dana's bold design sensibilities, paired with a staid commitment to advancing social justice for women and within the African American community through political involvement, marked her as a unique and progressive patron of architecture at the turn historic site through the Historic Presof the century.



> Dana paid \$45,000 for the construction and an additional \$15,000 for the Wright-designed furnishings. She lived in the home from 1904 until about 1928, when, suffering from increasing financial constraints, she closed the main house and moved to a small cottage on the grounds.

> Struggling with related dementia, in 1944 she sold the home to Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Thomas for their publishing firm.

> The State of Illinois purchased the house in 1981 and maintains it as a ervation division of the Illinois Depart-

GONE BUT NOT FORGOTTEN

FANCY POINT, the huge (and eventually demolished) 19th century 16-room mansion designed by internationally known Springfield architect E.E.Myers and built by Ernest Gehlmann for New Berlin farmer Wellington B. Huffaker is long gone except in family renderings and antiques, but its roots live on in memories shared by Huffaker's great great granddaughter, Allison Huffaker Smith (right) who provided a historical Powerpoint perspective in October on her family's and the area's history for Society members and guests. Its design won Myers a prize in the 1865 Paris Exposition.


