
Famed Author to Speak at September 9 Preview

“Sangamon County Through the Arts,” Ticket Deadline Nearing As Society Launches New Season With Major Event in Springfield

There’s still time to get tickets for the Friday, September 9 Sangamon County Historical Society season opener at the Old State Capitol, a private preview of the following day’s “Sangamon History Through the Arts” celebration.

The evening includes a talk by internationally known, best-selling author, Steve Berry, an advocate of historic preservation.

“We’re just delighted by great response and cooperation we’ve gotten from the arts community, the Old State Capitol and its Foundation and the many artists and historical organizations that will be joining in the event. Friday night’s program is a wonderful kick-off for our meeting season, a truly special event that our members should not miss. There will be lots to do and see before the historic site is open to

the general public the next day including the display of art works of every sort that focus on a Sangamon County history theme,” noted Nancy Chapin,

Society president.. Winners of the art contest will be announced at the Friday reception.

Tickets, at \$20 per person, include wine and light hors d’oeuvres. To get the special rate that’s being extended only to members and guests of historical organizations participating in the Saturday event, your check must be received by the Society by September 5. After that date, tickets are \$30 per person. *(A ticket order form is on page 7).*

Author of the Cotton Malone Series of historical novels, thrillers, and short stories published by Ballentine Books, Berry has 12 million books in print, which have been translated into 40 languages and sold in 51 countries. His novels have earned spots on the **New York Times, USA Today, Pub-**

**William Hughes Diller, Jr.,
Honorary Director
(July 15, 1916 - June 4, 2011)**

Honorary Director William Hughes Diller, Jr. died June 4 at The Villages, Florida, and was buried in Oak Ridge Cemetery with military honors June 7.

Diller was the last Springfield member of a family who were well known to the earliest settlers and to Springfieldians over four generations. He was the son of William Hughes Diller Sr. and Corinne Payne Diller.



A lifelong member and the longest living member of the First Presbyterian Church, Diller served as Deacon and Elder. He was a member of the local, state and national Society of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) since 1942 and served as an officer in the Springfield SARS Chapter. In 2006, he was honored at the organization's national convention in Chicago when he was presented with a with a 65 Year Membership Award. In 1980 Diller was awarded the Silver Good Citizenship Medal by the Illinois Society.

In late August, 1983, he and over 100 compatriots from across the country flew to Paris to participate in week-long events commemorating the 200th anniversary of the Signing of the Treaty of Paris, which concluded the Revolutionary War.

Diller served as President of the Sangamon County Historical Society 1986 to 1987 and was named an Honorary Director of the Society in 2006. He was a major sponsor of the restoration of Pioneer Park when the Society received that land in the 1960s.

He was also a charter member of the Texas Jack Society, President of the Civil War Round Table, and served as President of the Evening Etude Society, and a member of Toastmasters, Abraham Lincoln Association, the Illinois Farm Bureau and the Council of World Affairs.

An avid reader of historical books, Diller was especially interested in the Civil War and Abraham Lincoln era and donated many historical books and other artifacts to universities and other historical organizations including the donation of President Abraham Lincoln's desk to the Illinois Old State Capital and a chair believed Lincoln sat in during visits to the Diller drug store.

The Society is grateful for a bequest it has received from the W. Hughes Diller, Jr. Trust.

Nearly 100 members of the Sangamon County Historical Society gathered at the Panther Creek Country Club on June 21 to help celebrate the organization's 50th anniversary.

lisher's Weekly and BookSense best-seller lists. His Cotton Malone Series includes *The Jefferson Key*, *The Emperor's Tomb*, *The Paris Vendetta*, *The Charlemagne Pursuit*, *The Venetian Betrayal*, *The Alexandria Link* and *The Templar Legacy*. He also has three stand-alone thrillers (*The Third Secret*, *The Romanov Prophecy* and *The Amber Room*) and two e-book original short stories, *The Devil's Gold* and *The Balkan Escape*.

A foundation, *History Matters*, started by Berry and his wife, Elizabeth, is dedicated to aiding the preservation of our heritage. A former attorney and professor, author Berry's road to publishing was long and arduous, spanning 12 years and 85 rejections over five separate manuscripts, but now he uses that experience and his publishing success to teach writing to audiences across the globe. In doing so, Berry uses these opportunities to promote historic preservation.

The Sangamon History through the Arts" celebration will run from Noon to 4 p.m., indoors, on Saturday and is free and open to the public. Well-known artists and performers will be demonstrating their talents throughout the historic building, including pen and ink artist and printmaker Bill Crook Jr., known for his landscapes and

city scenes; sculptor John McClarey, whose Lincoln sculptures can be seen significant restoration projects here world-wide; stained glass artist Steve Brooks, a life-long Springfield resident and Dana Thomas House; prize-

winning watercolorist Jan L. Sorenson; pastel artist George King, president of the Illinois Prairie Pastel Society; singer, story teller and historian Tom Irwin; Vachel Lindsay scholar Dennis Camp, professor emeritus of English at the University of Illinois; the Springfield International Dancers who will be performing works reflecting Springfield's heritage; Peter Ellertsen of the Prairieland Dulcimer Strings, and the Old State Capitol Chorale. Other artists and performers were being added as *Historico* went to press.

The Society and other key history organizations will also have displays including the Abraham Lincoln Association, the Old State Capitol Foundation, the Pleasant Plains Historical Society (Clayville), the Vachel Lindsay Foundation, the Springfield History Museum and Iles House. Additional groups are expected to participate.



