The Underground Railroad in Pleasant Plains Wed., May 21 5:30 pm @ Farmingdale Presbyterian Church

The Society is hosting its third program on Underground Railroad activities in Sangamon County on Wednesday, May 21st at 5:30 at Farmingdale Presbyterian Church, 7971 Farmington Cemetery Rd., Pleasant Plains. They will focus on 5 brave people (and some of their relatives) buried nearby who worked pre-Civil War time to move slaves north to Canada. One of them had an interaction with President Lincoln. hiring him to represent him and his son. One of them, Jay Slater, had a house that is still standing on Lincoln Trail Road and is now owned by Anna Stone. Ms. Stone lived across the street from this house all of her childhood and moved away during her adult years but returned and has many interesting facts about how well and differently the house was built.

The story of the underground railroad at Farmington began on October 25th, 1833, when a colony of 52 New Englanders, many of them abolitionists, arrived at

Springfield after a ten-week journey from St. Lawrence County in upstate New York. The Reverend Billious Pond served as their pastor during their ten-week journey. Others who will be honored and who were part of that group include Jay Slater, Thomas Galt, Stephen Child and Dr. John Lyman.

Both State Senator Doris Turner and Tazewell County Clerk John C. Ackerman will speak on Illinois' research and attempts to create a permanent commission around this important work and all the individuals who were involved.

Marbold History

Barbara Van Dyke-Brown, a descendent of the Marbold family, presented the history of the Marbold family, the homestead in Greenview they called Elmwood, and the work of the Historic Marbold Farmstead Association in preserving the Marbold mansion.

At the urging of his brother who lived in Petersburg and the death of his wife, John Marbold came from Germany to New Orleans in 1847. From there, he set off for Petersburg, - first on a paddlewheel, then a stagecoach, arriving in Elkhart, and finally by oxcart to Petersburg. In 1850 he bought 200 acres of land and built his brick home. He helped other German immigrants get a stronghold in the area, hiring men to help make bricks on site or work the farm. The farm expanded over the years to 4000 acres and was passed to his son, Henry who started the Greenview Marbold Bank, and later, in 1915, to his grandson Benjamin (Van Dyke-Brown's grandfather). Benjamin became the President of the Marbold Bank but lost his wealth - and his home - after the bank failed in 1927.

The home was rented until the 1950s and then remained empty for many years; some restoration occurred in the 1990s. For years the house and land sat empty and fell into disrepair – the roofline sagged, windows had been broken out, brush covered the foundation, and the interior had been damaged by rodents and termites as well as looters who had ripped out fireplace mantels etc.

A group of concerned citizens in Greenview formed the Marbold Association and purchased the house in 2012. Since then, with fundraising, events, festivals, and donations, the group has been able to complete major restoration. Van Dyke-Brown presented before and after pictures of the work which included rebuilding the summer kitchen and carriage house, removing roofs from several outbuildings to shore up the brick structures, rebuilding the conservatory that had fallen in, plastering, dealing with termites and rodents and much more.

"There is always more to do, but we have come a long way. The parlor is now completely furnished, and the summer kitchen is a working kitchen where we bring groups of school children to learn about what life was like on a farm."

Reisch Charities Donates to the Sangamon County Historical Society

George Reisch, Roy Mayfield, Jeff DeGeal, Chuck Costello, Rob Malaway, and Vince Salvo, members of the Reisch Brew Crew, a Springfield based collectors club dedicated to the history of the Reisch Brewery, presented a \$1000 check to the Society at our April 15th program. George Reisch, a former brewer at Anheuser-Busch and descendent of the Reisch Brewery family, said, "We want to give you the money to help with your annual cemetery walk."

Reisch Brewery started by Franz Reisch in 1849 in Springfield. The complex included eleven buildings which stood on the present site of the SIU School of Medicine. Generations of the family ran the operation, including Ed Reisch who was the last brewmaster. He left Springfield in 1963 to work at Pabst Brewing Co. in Milwaukee. The Springfield operation closed in 1967.

The Brew Crew formed in 2008; there are over fifty members from all over Central Illinois who collect beer-related items and help preserve Springfield's brewery history. Roy Mayfield, founder of the Brew Crew, and others worked to convince George Reisch and his family members to recreate the Gold Top beer brand.

Reisch Charities formed as a 501c3 in 2019 and that year, when Ed turned 100, the family surprised him with the first taste of the beer that hadn't been brewed in over 50 years.

Reisch said, "This was just going to be one run, but people kept asking for it so now it is brewed in Wisconsin, and we have it available all over."

The Reisch Charities is a 501c3 and proceeds are donated to not-for-profits in the Springfield area.

In addition to the Sangamon County Historical Society, Edwards Place and Sucker State Preservation, a group that preserves gravestones, received donations.



If you want to access the Info Hub from your cell phone, download the Member Plus App.



Military Vehicle Show. Get an up close look at their military vehicles and their modern versions. The Living History Detachment will be on hand to answer questions.




Dana-Thomas House Foundation
